Quoi de neuf à la bibliothèque ces temps-ci? Les 14 et 15 février dernier, nous avons organisé la seconde édition des jeux d'évasion sur le thème Le Prisonnier du Donjon. Cette fois-ci, nous avons invité 4 classes de 5e année de l'école Saint-Noël Chabanel, et nous avons offert l'activité à 3 groupes de jeunes après l'école, pour un total de 120 jeunes participants. Tous les groupes ont réussi à résoudre les énigmes et ont pu sortir du donjon du roi Hastur!

Pour le printemps 2017, en plus de nos activités scientifiques, du club d'échecs et des soirées de jeux vidéos, nous poursuivons notre partenariat

avec le Centre de Loisirs René Goupil et accueillons à nouveau le Club d'impro, animé par l'intervenant Dedou.



Une nouvelle activité s'ajoute à la liste: une soirée de jeux de société pour les 8 à 12 ans, de 18h à 19h, un vendredi par mois. L'idée est de faire découvrir aux jeunes les jeux de la bibliothèque ainsi que des jeux plus complexes qui leur permettra de développer leur logique et leur capacité à travailler en équipe. Le tout accompagné de biscuits et d'une tasse de tisane!

Au menu des événements à la bibliothèque, on retrouve la finale hivernale du club d'impro, le 28 mars dernier, dans laquelle se sont affrontées nos deux équipes, une chasse aux trésors organisée par 2 enfants, Afaf et Narimane (10 avril), un tournoi de jeux vidéos (28 avril) et un tournoi d'échecs (juin). La Bibliothèque des Jeunes s'exporte aussi hors de ses murs! Elle sera présente au Gala des Nouveaux-nés, pour accueillir les tout-petits et leurs familles, le 27 avril. Nous animerons également une activité pour la Semaine Québécoise des familles au Parc Ovila Légaré, le vendredi 12 mai, en compagnie de la Bibliothèque de Saint-Michel.

De nombreux autres projets sont en processus de création, tant de façon indépendante qu'en concertation de quartier, mais ils demeurent secrets pour le moment. Chuuuuut!

What's new with the library? On February 14th and 15th we organized a second "escape the room" activity, known as *The Prisoner of the Dungeon*. For this activity, we invited four 5th-grade classes from Saint-Noël Chabanel School to attend. Three separate groups of after-school children also had a chance to test their skills. A grand total of 120 children participated in the fun and all players successfully solved the riddles and escaped King Hastur's dungeon!

For Spring 2017, along with our regularly scheduled Science Club, Chess Club, and Video Game Nights, we will be offering an Improv Club, in partnership with the Centre de Loisirs René Goupil and the animator *Dedou*.

Another new addition to the activity roster is a monthly Society Game Night. It will take place one Friday of each month from 6pm to 7pm and it's for children ages 8 to 12. Participants get the chance to discover the library's collection of games. The more complex games will help to develop critical thinking and team-building skills... while the children enjoy some cookies and a cup of tea at the same time!

Special events (past and future) to highlight:

- the Winter finale for the Improv Club (March 28th) - two groups faced off against each other and demonstrated their improv skills,
- a treasure hunt organized by two children, Afaf and Narimane (April 10th),
- a video game tournament (April 28th), and
- a chess tournament (June).

The Montreal Children's Library is also doing outreach! On April 27th we will be at the *Gala des Nouveaux-nés*, helping to welcome babies and their families to the community. On top of that, we will be animating an activity for *Family Week* at the Ovila Légaré Parc on May 12th, in collaboration with the Saint-Michel Library.

Many other projects, both independently organized and/or in partnership with other community organizations, are coming but they remain secret for now. Shhhhhhh!
